## Dear Dr. Rhody,

Two years ago I ordered some very special seed from the Rhododendron Species Foundation. I planted part of the seed as soon as I received it. My friends suggested I plant part of the seed and then make another planting later. My life became very busy and I forgot to plant the rest of the seed. While going through some containers, I found the remainder of the seed. Is the seed still good? Should I go ahead and plant it?

Dear Bob,

Your story is a common one. Fortunately it is quite probable that some of your prized seed is still viable. Many people store their seed in a refrigerator. This seems to prolong the length of the time you can have the seed and still expect to get some germination.

The Royal Horticultural Society keeps their seed up to five years. I have ordered seed 3 to 4 years old and have been somewhat successful with germination.

The rate of germination seems to decrease each year but some seedlings are better than none.

I suggest you plant your seed and hope for the best. The expense and effort are minimal so - go for it!

I do recommend that you start your seed in coconut coir fiber. I have had the best success with this medium.

A somewhat related topic is pollen storage. I have found that pollen stored in a pill capsules or glass vials and placed in a refrigerator can remain viable up to five years. If you have pollen from a favorite plant don't be afraid to use it even if it has been stored for a while.

## Plant of the Month

This month's rhododendron is 'The King'. No not Elvis but *R. rex*.

*R. rex* was first found by a plant hunter in 1911 in northern Yunnan, China and was later introduced into cultivation by Plant hunter George Forrest in 1913. It is one of the 'Big Leaf' rhododendrons, being in sub-section Falconera. Plants that are in sub-sections Falconera and Grandia are frequently referred to as the 'Big Leaf' rhododendrons because some of the species in those sub-sections have huge leaves. But there are other rhododendrons that could be called 'Big Leaves' some having larger leaves than our plant of the month, *R. rex*.

Plants such as *R. calophytum* and *R. sutchense* both in sub-section Fortunea have extremely large leaves. Even our own native species, *R. macrophyllum*, which is in sub-section Pontica has large leaves on certain plants. In fact, the name 'macrophyllum' means 'with big leaves' so when you hear someone referring to a plant as one of the big leaves they are probably referring to plants classified in sub-sections 'falconera and grandia'.

In its native habitat *R. rex* can grow to become a twenty to forty foot tree but it is unlikely to reach that height in cultivation, more like to about fifteen feet. You could expect a ten year-old plant to become about four or five feet tall.

Its lance shaped leaves are about eight inches long and four inches wide [sometimes *R. macrophyllum* has leaves larger than that.] The topside of the leaf is a dark green and the underside is grey or yellow or something in between.

The flower truss is composed of fifteen to twenty four tubular bell shaped flowers and come in colors of rose, pink, white or cream. They may or may not have a crimson or purple blotch.

There are several really nice plants of *R. rex* in the Rhododendron Species Foundation Garden including a named clone 'Quartz' which was found by Joseph Rock on one of his explorations.

*R. rex* is fairly hardy in our area but like all rhododendrons with large leaves, should be protected from the wind and direct sunlight.
